RESOLUTION NO. 136, S-2011

A RESOLUTION APPROVING CITY ORDINANCE NO. 83, S-2011, OTHERWISE KNOWN AS THE "COMPREHENSIVE SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT CODE" OF SCIENCE CITY OF MUÑOZ, NUEVA ECIJA.

WHEREAS, it is the policy of the State to protect the populace from hazardous products and promote the right to health and instill health consciousness among them;

WHEREAS, it is also the policy of the State, consistent with the Constitutional ideal to promote the general welfare, to safeguard the interests of the populace and investors within the city;

WHEREAS, the government shall institute a balanced policy whereby the prohibition and improper throwing of garbage or trash shall be forbidden in order to promote a healthful environment and protect the citizens from the hazards of waste or garbage, and at the same time ensure that the interests of populace and investors are not adversely compromised;

WHEREAS, owing to this significant citation in R.A. 9003, the Honorable City Mayor expressed his motivation to comply with the said Republic Act by requesting the August Body to enact a Comprehensive Solid Waste Management Code and the Sangguniang Panlungsod took action to the request, as a result, to wit;

NOW THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the foregoing premises, on motion of Honorable Arturo V. Santos, Chairman, Committee on Environment, duly seconded by Hon. Myrna R. Corpuz, Hon. Domingo R. De Belen, Hon. Alberto M. Castañeda and Hon. Roberto V. Domingo of the Honorable Fourth City Council of Science City of Muñoz, Nueva Ecija in its session assembled herein, be it;

RESOLVED, as it is hereby resolved, to approve the City Ordinance No. 83, S-2011 otherwise known as the “Comprehensive Solid Waste Management Code” of the Science City of Muñoz, Nueva Ecija;

RESOLVED FURTHER, that copies of this Resolution be furnished the Office of the City Mayor, Hon. Efren L. Alvarez, D.Hum, to the Office of Sangguniang Panlalawigan of the Province of Nueva Ecija, Palayan City, Nueva Ecija and all other offices and agencies concerned, for their information and appropriate action.

CITY ORDINANCE NO. 83, S-2011
COMPREHENSIVE SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT ORDINANCE

WHEREAS, the Science City of Muñoz is committed to the protection, preservation and conservation of the eco-system, through the implementation of an integrated, comprehensive and ecological solid waste management initiative;

WHEREAS, it is the responsibility of the City Government to effectively and efficiently implement the solid waste management system, to put an end to the indiscriminate disposal of garbage by households, commercial, industrial and institutional establishments that causes unsightly surroundings, pollution of the environment and the spread of communicable diseases;

WHEREAS, the practice of waste segregation for re-use recycling does not only reduce the cost of collection and disposal of garbage, but also conserves natural resources and avoid the pollution of the environment;

NOW THEREFORE, be it enacted by the Sangguniang Panlungsod in a session assembled,

ARTICLE I
TITLE of ORDINANCE

SECTION I TITLE OF ORDINANCE

This ordinance shall be known as the COMPREHENSIVE SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT ORDINANCE of Science City of Muñoz and shall hereinafter referred to as the “Ordinance”

ARTICLE II
COVERAGE

SECTION 2. COVERAGE

The ordinance shall apply to all residential houses, commercial and industrial establishments, institutions like Hospitals, Schools (Public and private, Churches, Public and Private offices, other establishments of any kind and agriculture areas that are within the jurisdiction of the Science City of Muñoz;

ARTICLE III AUTHORITY AND OBJECTIVES

SECTION 3. COVERAGE

This ordinance is enacted to supplement the provisions of existing laws, ordinances, and executive orders on Solid Waste Management;

SECTION 4 OBJECTIVES

The objectives of the ordinance are the following:

- a. To promote and protect the health safety, convenience and the general welfare of inhabitants in the Science City of Muñoz;
- b. To ensure the round the clock cleanliness in the Science City of Muñoz through an orderly waste management;
- c. To eradicate the unsightly, uncovered and overflowing waste containers in streets, public places, open spaces and the indiscriminate dumping of garbage on river banks, esteros, sewage canals and other water channels;
- d. To guide, control and regulate the generation, segregation, collection, transportation and disposal of solid waste within the locality and promote an orderly and sanitary system for the same;
- e. To put an end the practice of using a dumpsite, which serves as breeding places of harmful insects which causes diseases, foul odor or harmful gases contributing to global warming and thinning of the “Ozone layer” generate leachate which pollute soil and water resources, and create unhealthy scavenging activities in the area;
- f. To minimize pollution from harmful gases produced by needless burning/incineration and polluted run-off of hazardous substances into waster supply sources; and
- g. To minimize generation of solid waste going to the Science City of Muñoz controlled dumpsite and maximize possible resources such as recycling, composting and utilization by
 - a. Encouraging the salvaging of possible recoverable elements from solid waste for re-use, and recycling back to production process.
 - b. Encouraging the recycling and resources recovery of waste in the household through backyard composting and bio-gas production.
 - c. Encouraging Non-government Organizations and the private sector’s participation in solid waste management, and
 - d. Providing assistance and cooperation in every barangay and in the disposal site.

ARTICLE IV DEFINITION OF TERMS

SECTION 5 TECHNICAL TERMS

The following Technical Terms as used in these City Ordinances are defined for clarity:

5.1 **Agricultural Waste** refers to waste generated from planting or harvesting of crops Trimming, or pruning of plants, animal manure and waste or run-of materials from farm or field;

5.2 **Body Number** refers to a controlled number assigned to each Eco-Aide by the Office of the City Planning development Office (CPDO) which is to be painted and displayed on each Junk cart for identification purposes;

5.3 **Bulky Wastes** refers to discarded large and unusual types of waste such as discarded furniture, big toys, packaging materials, appliances, large branches of trees and other similar items;

5.4 **Collection** refers to the act of removing waste from the source of communal storage point;

5.5 **Collection Frequency** refers to the number of times collection of waste is provided in a given period of time;

5.6 **Color code** - a specific color or hue assigned to each Eco-aide by the CPDO for proper identification;

5.7 **Commercial Establishments** refers to all establishments which include but not limited to those engaged in transportation, communication, storage, commerce, service and the like;

5.8 **Controlled Dump Site** refers to a disposal site at which solid waste is deposited in accordance with the minimum prescribed standards of site operation;

5.9 **Composting** refers to the controlled decomposition of Bio-degradable waste by micro-organism, mainly bacteria, fungi and activators under controlled conditions;

5.10 **Disposal site** refers to the site where solid waste is finally discharged and deposite;

5.11 **Ecological Solid Waste** refers to the systematic administration of activities which provide for segregation at source, segregated transportation storage, transfer, processing, treatment and disposal of solid waste and all other waste management activities which do not harm the environment;

5.12 **Environmental acceptability** refers to the quality of being reusable, biodegradable or compostable, recyclable and not toxic or hazardous to the environment;

5.13 **Food Wastes** are organic wastes generated from restaurants, canteens, eateries and similar establishments;

5.14 **Hazardous Wastes** are solid waste or combination of solid waste which because of concentration or physical, chemical or infectious characteristics may (a) cause or significantly contribute to an increase in mortality or (b) increase serious irreversible or incapacitating hazard to human health or the environment and disposed, stored, transported improperly;

5.15 **Industrial Waste** refers to any languid gaseous, or solid matter, or other waste substances or combination thereof resulting from any process of industry, manufacturing trade or business or from the developed processing or recovery of any natural resources which may cause or tend to cause pollution, or contribute to the pollution of water, air and land resources;

5.16 **Leachate** refers to the liquid produced when waste undergoes decomposition, and when water percolates through solid undergoing decomposition. It is a contaminated liquid that flows in to the recycling facility;

5.17 **Material Recovery Facility** includes a solid waste transfer station or sorting station, drop-off center, a composting facility and recycling facility;

5.18 **City Waste** refers to wastes produced from activities within local government units which include a combination of domestic commercial, industrial and institutional wastes and street litter;

5.19 **Open Dump Site** refers to a disposal area, wherein the solid wastes are indiscriminately thrown or disposed of without due planning and consideration for environmental and health standards;

5.20 **Receptacles** shall refer to individual containers used for sources separation and collection of recyclable materials;

5.21 **Recyclable Material** refers to any waste material retrieved from the waste stream that can still be converted into materials that can be use or for other purposes, including, but not limited to, newspapers, ferrous scrap metal, non-ferrous scrap metal, used oil, corrugated cardboard, aluminum glass, office paper, tin cans, and other materials as may be determined by the board;

5.22 **Recycling** refers to the treating of used or waste materials through a process of making them suitable for beneficial use and for other purposes, and includes any process by which solid waste materials are transformed into new products in such a manner that the original products may lose their identity, and which may be used as raw materials for the production of other goods or services;

5.23 **Segregation** refers to a solid waste management practice of separation of different materials found in solid waste in order to promote recycling and re-use of resources and to reduce the volume of waste for collection and disposal;

5.24 **Solid Waste** refers to all discarded household and commercial waste, non-hazardous institutional and industrial waste, street sweeping, construction debris, agricultural waste, and other non-hazardous/non-toxic solid waste;

5.25 **Solid Waste Management** refers to the discipline with control on generation, segregation, storage, collection, transfer, processing and disposal of solid waste in a manner that is in accord with the best principles of public health, economics, engineering, conservation, aesthetics and other environmental considerations responsive to public attitudes;

5.26 **Special Waste** refers to household hazardous waste such as paints, thinners, household batteries, acid batteries, spray canisters and the like. These include waste from residential and commercial sources that consist of bulky waste, consumer electronics, white goods, yard waste that are collected separately, batteries, oil and tires. These wastes are usually handled separately from other residential and commercial waste;

5.27 **White goods** refers to the large worn-out or broken household, commercial, and industrial appliances such as stoves, refrigerators, dishwashers, and clothes washers and dryers collected separately. White goods are usually dismantled for the recovery of specific materials (eg. Copper, aluminum, etc);

ARTICLE V RESPONSIBILITY FOR COMPLIANCE

SECTION 6. RESPONSIBILITY FOR COMPLIANCE

The City Environment and Natural Resources Office (City ENRO) with the assistance of the City Health Office and other concerned departments and/or offices, as deemed necessary, shall be responsible in the strict, effective and efficient implementation of this city ordinance.

City ENRO shall

- a) Provide engineering technological and operational issues associated with the generation, handling and storage, collection and transport and disposal of waste;
- b) Manage the rehabilitation and maintenance of Science City of Muñoz Controlled Dumpsite;
- c) Spearhead the implementation of a recycling program;
- d) Conduct regular inspection to all collection routes, most especially to the central business area located at the main road and other major thoroughfares;
- e) Conduct scheduled and/or periodic inspection to all barangays;
- f) Issue citation tickets and/or notices of violation to all concerned who do not comply with this city ordinance;
- g) Maintain cleanliness of all main roads and major thoroughfares, rivers, creeks, canal and other bodies of water;
- h) Provide regular repair and preventive maintenance on all solid waste collection and landfill equipment and other government owned equipment such as construction and maintenance equipment, fire trucks, ambulance, etc....
- i) Attend to complaints emanating from the public community and business sector regarding solid waste management services;
- j) Ensure that the sanitary technicians and drivers wear prescribed uniforms and ID to give them dignity in their work;

Solid Waste Management shall be conducted only within the territorial confines of Science City of Muñoz, Nueva Ecija, except for special cases as in unforeseen disaster and or calamity, for as long as the said services to be rendered are approved by the City Mayor.

**ARTICLE VI
WASTE GENERATION AND STORAGE**

SECTION 7. RESIDENTIAL, RESTAURANTS, AND THE LIKE, HOSPITAL AREAS

Owners and occupants of households, lessors, lessees, proprietors and/or administrators of commercial and industrial establishments, government and non-government institutions shall be responsible for the cleanliness of their surroundings approximately 5 meters radius from their owned or occupied properties to maintain a clean and healthy environment.

The persons and institutions referred above must attend to their respective surroundings and ensure that the same are free from tall and uncut grasses, untrimmed hedges, clogged or silted canals, piled up debris and dangling posters, tree branches or trunks that hamper electric wires and posts. Fallen foliage must be swept and accumulated soil removed from curbs and gutters

For violation of this section, the following penalties shall be imposed:

FREQUENCY	FINES
1. First offense	Php 200.00
2. Second offense	500.00
3. Third offense	1,000.00

a. Any subsequent and repeated violation or violations shall subject the offender to the maximum penalty of fine of not less than Php 2,500.00 or an imprisonment of not less than 30 days or both, such fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the Court;

b. Residents of residential establishments shall learn the two (2) kinds of waste:
Bio-degradable/compostable or non-biodegradable/non-compostable;

These two (2) kinds of waste shall be segregated and stored at the site or place where they are produced.

The GARBAGE COLLECTOR personnel should see to it that in every household the garbage must be segregated at the source and garbage not segregated shall not be collected. Secondary segregation is done by the collectors as well as converting all their non-biodegradable or recyclable materials into “cash” **as incentive or extra income**. While the Materials Recovery Facility (MRF) personnel collects all biodegradable materials for “composting” and converting it into Organic Fertilizer as the final or third segregation.

c. The concerned residents shall ensure that the generated Solid Waste shall be properly separated in two (2) or more containers such as cans, sacks, bins, etc., that will facilitate sanitary, efficient handling, storage, collection, transport or disposal. Bio-degradable shall be placed in covered cans or pails and Non-bio-degradable in sacks, bags, or boxes;

For violation of this section, the following penalties shall be imposed:

FREQUENCY	FINES
1. First offense	Php 200.00
2. Second offense	500.00
3. Third offense	1,000.00

Any subsequent and repeated violation or violations shall subject the offender to the maximum penalty of fine of not less than Php 1,500.00 or an imprisonment of not less than 1 day but no more than 15 days or both, such fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the Court.

d. Wastes will be collected on a designated date for biodegradable and non-biodegradable for easy handling and collection;

e. Food waste from restaurants, canteens and eateries, etc...shall be properly contained in plastic liners to prevent spillage;

f. Hazardous waste such as hospital and clinical wastes shall be stored in a plastic bag and hypodermic needles and empty ampules shall be properly disposed in **special containers** and shall be labeled with appropriate sign referring to the hazardous contents, this is being disposed in a special septic vault in the sanitary landfill;

Violation of any provisions of items (d) to (f) of Section 7 shall be penalized as follows;

FREQUENCY	FINES
1. First offense	Php 200.00
2. Second offense	500.00
3. Third offense	1,000.00

SECTION 8. COMMERCIAL AREAS

a. The storage containers for segregated commercial wastes shall be communal or individual with over depending on its location for collection and transport process. The containers shall be properly marked to distinguish the type of waste to be stored therein;

b. Enclosed communal receptacles shall be located along the collection routes where the generated waste shall be brought by the lessee;

c. The lobby fronting sidewalks, immediate grounds of commercial establishment shall be maintained clean and presentable by the owner, lessee of the establishment;

d. The fronting sidewalks and immediate areas of stalls/open spaces of market/ agoras shall be kept clean and orderly by the lessee of said stall/space at all times;

SECTION 9. INDUSTRIAL AND INSTITUTIONAL AREA

a. The head of industrial or institutional firm shall ensure the proper and hygienic storage of generated and segregated waste in receptacles/containers which shall be situated along collection routes. The containers shall be properly marked according to the type of solid waste stored therein;

b. Hazardous waste shall be stored safely in good, durable and covered receptacles which should be located in a secured and distant site, prior to final collection, transport and disposal;

c. The head of any industrial or institutional firm shall ensure the cleanliness and orderliness of its facilities, yards and its fronting sidewalks and street;

d. Hazardous waste (chemical, pathological, biological and radiological) shall be stored, collected, transported and disposed of in accordance with applicable laws, guideline, rules and regulation of the Environmental Management Bureau under the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR), Department of Health (DOH) and the Philippines Nuclear Research Institute (PNRI) under the Department of Science and Technology (DOST);

SECTION 10. AGRICULTURAL AREAS

Agricultural areas including livestock farms homogenous agricultural waste, rice straws, corn cobs, leaves, animal manure, etc., shall be properly stock piled by the concerned farmer.

ARTICLE VII WASTE PROCESSING AND RESOURCE RECOVERY

SECTION 11. RESIDENTIAL

- a. Segregated recyclables shall be properly stored before collection. The recyclables shall be collected separately by the garbage collector and brought to Material Recovery Facility (MRF);
- b. Purok leaders designated in every purok shall oversee the collection of the recyclables and shall be responsible in coordinating with the garbage collector;
- c. All food waste must be put in an enclosed container and kitchen waste shall be collected as fodder or feeds for animals. Those portion that are not suitable as fodder shall be collected or be composted in resident backyards;
- d. Residents shall avoid open burning and dumping and adopt the reuse and recycling practices;

SECTION 12. COMMERCIAL AREAS

- a. Segregation of waste from commercial areas shall be mandatory before issuance or renewal of business permits;
- b. The market shall adopt a segregation scheme that will facilitate the segregation of biodegradable waste from non-biodegradable waste;
- c. Food waste from commercial areas (e.g. food centers like carinderias, restaurants, canteens, etc.,) shall not be disposed in sewers;

SECTION 13. INDUSTRIAL AND INSTITUTIONAL AREAS

- a. An industrial establishment segregation of bio-degradable and non-biodegradable waste shall be performed to avoid foul odor and proliferation of flies and other insects carrying communicable diseases;
- b. Public and private schools shall adopt appropriate resource recovery and recycling provision as strategies and it shall be included in their educational curriculum;

SECTION 14. AGRICULTURAL AREAS

Agricultural waste (e.g. rice straws, corn cobs, etc.) shall not be burned. Manure shall not be improperly dumped but shall be stockpiled in a proper location and composted. Animal manure can also be decomposed or utilized for bio-gas production;

ARTICLE VIII COLLECTION AND TRANSPORTATION OF WASTE

SECTION 15. RESIDENTIAL AREAS

- a. The concerned residents shall ensure that the solid wastes are brought out in front of their gates/ doors and/ or along the collection routes of the collection vehicles/ cart during the collection period;
- b. They shall report to the City ENRO office any uncollected waste within the vicinity of residence;
- c. The specific date and hour of garbage collection in particular locations shall be scheduled and announced for the strict compliance of all concerned;

SECTION 16. COMMERCIAL AREAS

- a. The owner/lessee of any enterprise shall be responsible for the timely positioning of stored waste during the collection period which shall be made known in advance by the proper authorities which shall likewise assist whenever necessary in the sanitary means of loading wastes for collection purposes;
- b. They shall remind the City ENRO as regards the collection of uncollected solid waste and other related matters;

SECTION 17. INDUSTRIAL AND INSTITUTIONAL AREAS

- a. The head of any industrial/institutional establishment shall assist the City ENRO in the orderly and sanitary way of collecting and transporting its solid waste;
- b. The collection and transportation of any hazardous waste shall be duly coordinated with the government agencies, Environmental Management Bureau (EMB) of Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR), Department of Health (DOH) and the Philippines Nuclear Research Institute (PNRI) concerned with types of waste;

City ENRO SHALL ENSURE THAT:

- a. All equipment used for the collection and transport of solid waste shall be enclosed or adequate provision shall be made for suitable cover (tarpaulin, canvass and/or protective nets) to eliminate spillage;
- b. All equipment used for the collection and transport of solid waste shall be operated and maintained to minimize health and safety hazards by the City ENRO personnel and general public to minimized health and safety hazard;
- c. All equipment used for the collection and transport of solid waste shall be maintained in good condition and kept clean to prevent the proliferation and attraction of vectors and the creation of nuisances;

- d. Safety devices including public address system shall be provided to all equipment used for the collection and transport of solid waste;
- e. All equipment used in the collection and transport of solid waste shall be provided with garbage jingle to notify the residents of an approaching collection equipment;
- f. The lyrics of the jingle are educational. It should encourage the people to value health and practice cleanliness as well as proper way of garbage disposal;
- g. All equipment used for the collection and transport of solid waste shall be provided with City slogans such as “PANATILIHIN ANG KALINISAN SA SCIENCE CITY OF MUÑOZ”;

ARTICLE IX DISPOSAL OF SOLID WASTE

SECTION 18. RESIDENTIAL, COMMERCIAL AND INSTITUTIONAL AREAS

- a. Incineration or open burning of solid waste shall be prohibited. Residual wastes after resources recovery, recycling and composting shall be done in the controlled dumpsite;
- b. Hospital waste especially pathological waste shall be sanitized and disposed of in a separate compartment in the open dumpsite;
- c. Illegal dumping of solid waste along street, alleys, river banks, and in any public places shall be strictly prohibited;

SECTION 19 INDUSTRIAL WASTES

- a. Other hazardous waste shall be disposed in accordance with the laws, rules, regulations and guidelines of the concerned national agencies like EMB of DENR, DOH, PNRI;

SECTION 20 SPECIAL PROVISIONS

- a. Garbage not segregated and placed in approved containers shall not be collected and shall be treated as disposed of in violation of existing anti-littering city ordinance and shall be penalized accordingly;
- b. Unsegregated garbage brought for disposal at the controlled dumpsite will not be accepted;

City ENRO will provide continuous coordination to all stakeholders, especially to the residential and business establishments; all businesses engaged in recycling will be advised to coordinate with all stakeholders intending to sell their solid waste. The City ENRO will undertake the following sequential measures to facilitate the implementation of the program.

- a. Create a planning committee by calling together people who will eventually be involved in the actual operation of the program.
- b. Preparation of planning/implementation and operational guidelines.
- c. Designate area where recyclers can deliver their source separated wastes.
- d. Provide color code and labeled recyclable bins on all designated drop-off centers.

- e. Provide a dedicated collection vehicle for all recyclables.
- f. Maintain and publish current listing of all businesses engaged in recycling.
- g. Conduct continuous workshops and provide brochures for guidelines and other educational materials to all stakeholders.
- h. Conduct City wide promotional and advertizing campaign.

**ARTICLE X
 SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT**

SECTION 10.1

Where shall fees be imposed in an amount sufficient to pay the cost of preparing, adopting and implementing the comprehensive Solid Waste Management City Ordinance pursuant to RA 9003 Chapter V Section 47.

The fees shall be collected from every household owners/lessees, commercial, industrial and institutional establishments located within the area covered by the garbage collection area.

**ARTICLE XI
VIOLATION AND PENALTY**

SECTION 22 VIOLATIONS AND PENALTY

Any individual person or one engaged in the operation and maintenance of an establishment/firm/facility, who violates any provision of this city ordinance, upon conviction shall be punished with a fine of not less than Php 500.00 or imprisonment of not less than (1) day or not more than 10 days or both at the discretion of the court, without prejudice to the imposition of a higher penalty indicated in Chapter VI. Section 49 of RA 9003.

For habitual violators who willfully violates any provisions of this city ordinance shall upon conviction be punished with a fine of not less than Php 2,500.00 but not more than Php 5,000.00 or imprisonment of not less than 15 days.

**ARTICLE XII
INCENTIVES**

SECTION 23 INCENTIVES

a. ACTS INIMICAL TO CLEANLINESS AND SANITATION

A fine of not less than Five hundred Pesos (Php 200.00) for first offence.....and not more than Five hundred Pesos (Php 500.00) or imprisonment of not less than one (1) day and more than fifteen (15) days or both at the discretion of the Court shall be imposed upon any person found guilty of the following acts or commissions:

- a. Littering on the streets, sidewalks, parks, playgrounds, and other public places, provided that the public vehicle or conveyance shall be considered as a public place for this purpose;
- b. Urinating, defecating or spitting in public places;
- c. Painting, inscribing or posting of graffiti on public or private buildings, walls, fences and similar places;
- d. Vandalism on public or private property;
- e. Failure to maintain the cleanliness of premises, surrounding public or private buildings or vacant lots. Provided that in addition to the liability of the owners for the penalties provided herein, the City Mayor may order the cleaning of the premises or vacant lot at the expense of the owner;

b. In lieu of arrest, a person found violating this city ordinance shall be issued a citation ticket in such form as The City Mayor may devise, requiring him to appear in the City ENRO within seventy-two (72) hours, the respondent may elect in lieu of prosecution to voluntarily pay a fine provided herein as follows:

FREQUENCY	FINES
1. First offense	Php 200.00
2. Second offense	500.00
3. Third offense	1,000.00

Provided, that in the third offense the voluntary payment of the fine as provided herein shall no longer be permitted. After the lapse of seventy two (72) hours, should the respondent fail to appear or voluntarily pay the fine, the case shall be referred to the Judge's office for appropriate action.

PUBLIC CONVEYANCES TO BE EQUIPPED WITH RECEPTACLES-PUBLIC

Conveyances should always be equipped with the waste receptacles. Throwing out litter cigarettes and other materials shall be prohibited.

It shall be the duty of the drivers and other responsible personnel of public conveyance to police their passengers. Failure or any negligence on their part shall be dealt with the applicable fines and penalties provided in this city ordinance. The erring passenger shall likewise be held for violation of this city ordinance.

LIQUID WASTE such as gasoline, oil lubricants and kerosene (petroleum-based) and other harmful and hazardous liquid substance shall not be spilled or discarded to pollute any soil and water such waste must be properly stored for recycling septic tanks and sewer effluents must be filtered before re-entry to any water, soil and air environs. Deliberate discharge for these types of waste shall be fined as follows;

FREQUENCY	FINES
1. First offense	Php 1,500.00
2. Second offense	2,000.00
3. Third offense	2, 500.00

SECTION 25. OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

A. CITIZEN'S RESPONSIBILITIES

Any citizen who is an actual witness to any violation of this ordinance shall immediately inform any public officer about the offense committed. Any citizen duly deputized by the office of the City Mayor may directly arrest violators of this ordinance.

B. ISSUANCE OF SANITATION CITATION TICKET

For violation of the City Ordinance existing ordinances on sanitation and/or environmental protection citation ticket shall be issued in lieu of arrest and/or prosecution. The citation ticket notifies the offender of the particular infraction of the city ordinance he has committed and advise him/her to surrender his/her Driver's license or valid ID or Residence Certificate, if either of the three mentioned are not presented, he/she will be invited to appear before the City ENRO for appropriate disposition of his/her case. Violations of minors will be the responsibility of parents.

C. DISTRIBUTION OF FINES AND ITS USES 25%

Proceeds from the fines collected or Citation Tickets issued shall accrue to the following distribution 50% for the barangay, 25% for the City ENRO and 25% for the apprehender where arrest/apprehensions of violators of environment/sanitation/health ordinances occur or where the Citation Tickets are issued: provided that such fines shall be intended and used for environment/sanitation/health project, programs and incentives for informer of violators of this ordinance in the barangay concerned.

D. FINES FOR LAW ENFORCER

Any public law enforcer who willfully or grossly neglects the performance of an act specially enjoined under R.A. 9003 implementing rules and regulations; or abuse his authority in the performance of his duty; or in any manner improperly performs his duties under this ACT shall be penalized as follows;

- a) First offense, written explanation within 48 hours after a notice has been given to him/her;
- b) Second offense suspension of not less than 15 days but not more than one (1) month without pay upon conviction;
- c) Third offense, filing of administrative case;
- d) For the purpose of enforcing this City Ordinance any citizen may file an appropriate action to the Sangguniang Panlungsod concerned.

ARTICLE XIV ENFORCEMENT

SECTION 26: ENFORCEMENT

Pursuant to RA 9003 Article II Section 10, Role of the LGUs in Solid Waste Management and RA 7160, otherwise known as the Local Government Code, the LGU shall be primarily responsible for the implementation and enforcement of the provisions of this act within their respective jurisdiction.

Each Barangay Council headed by the Punong Barangay is hereby directed to assist in the implementation and enforcement of the provisions of this city ordinance in their respective barangays. The City ENRO Officer or their designated deputies shall help the Science City of Muñoz in the implementation and enforcement of this city ordinances.

ARTICLE XV PENAL PROVISIONS

SECTION 27: All provisions of City Ordinances, orders, and regulations inconsistent herewith are hereby modified or repealed accordingly.

SECTION 28: Separability of Provisions. If any provision of this city ordinances, or the application of such provision to any person or circumstances, is declared unconstitutional, the remaining provisions applicable to other persons or circumstances shall not be affected by such declaration.

SECTION 29: Effectivity: This city ordinance shall take effect immediately upon approval and or after compliance with the existing rules and regulations on posting and publication.

The Science City of Muñoz strictly orders / implements:

SECTION I – Strictly prohibiting throwing or littering of any waste along street, river, pond, dikes, canals, plazas, markets, schools and other public places including private lots within the Science City of Muñoz.

SECTION II – No other places are designated for of throwing waste except the public dump site in Barangay Villa Isla Science City of Muñoz, Nueva Ecija.

SECTION III – Any person violating the city ordinance will be punished with the following fines.

- a. 1st offense Php 200.00 or imprisonment of 5 days or both in accordance with the decision of the court.
- b. 2nd offense Php 500.00 or imprisonment of 10 days or both in accordance with the decision of the court.
- c. 3rd offense Php 1,000.00 and imprisonment of not more than 15 days or both in accordance with the decision of the court.

The City ordinances in accordance with the preservation and conservation of the surrounding environment and to protect the citizenry from polluted and poisonous air.

Section 1. This City Ordinance prohibits the burning of rice straw.

Section 2. Strictly prohibiting any person in any place or locality within the Science City of Muñoz to burn rice straw and rice hulls.

Section 3. Any person caught burning rice straw or rice hulls will have the following punishment or fines:

- 1st offense-fine – Php 200.00
- 2nd offense-fine – Php 500.00
- 3rd offense and the next offense-fine – Php 1,000.00

Section 4. Any ordinances of this city against or not in accordance with this ordinance, will have no effects.

Section 5. City ordinance will be in effect after it is published or circulated in the Science City of Muñoz.
